

- 1. There was a slight reduction in the percentage of tenants satisfied with the quality of their homes this is in part will be down to the postponement of a window replacement program for one of our areas to the financial year 2023-24 as I report the program is underway.
- 2. The last stock condition report was a desktop exercise due to the COVID-19 emergency. A physical stock condition will be carried out in June 2023. All our properties currently meet the SHQS and EESSH The stock is assessed against 5 main quality groupings and 55 elements to meet SHQS. Survey samples are selected to include all house types from each of our development phases and component replacement cycles are either brought forward or extended in accordance with consultant recommendations. Information from SCS is used to update our 5 & 30 year projections. 90.7% of our housing stock are newbuild properties constructed between 1993 - 2006.


